Bridging the Gap

- The first last-dollar scholarship program in NJ
- •\$32+ million awarded to 2,920 students since 2015
- •62% were first-generation students
- •43% were Black and Hispanic students
- •Students who received BTG had higher first-year retention (+5%) and on-time graduation (+10%) rates


